

As we wrapped up a successful year of neighborhood engagement and fun activities across Duboce Triangle, I have my sights on another year of environmental outreach, community building, and continuing to create a safer more inclusive neighborhood for everyone.

2023 is an opportunity to do better, be better, and get involved in **Duboce Triangle Neighborhood Association**. Volunteering is not just a gift for those you serve; volunteering creates wellbeing and gives life more meaning. Whether you're a student looking for leadership opportunities, a working professional

seeking a break from the routine of work, or simply looking to build a better community, your help is needed with your local **Duboce Triangle Neighborhood Association**.

2022 ushered in a hive of activities, engagement and community meeting, helping to lend structure to this year's two main projects:

### Noe Corridor Activation

Working to create a vibrant, social, economic and cultural zone that supports and promotes activities like the Farmers' Market, weekend Art Mart, and seasonal celebrations like Spring Eggstravaganza, Summer Family Pride, DTNA/Castro Family Halloween Party, and Winter Wonderland.

### The Sanchez/Steiner/Duboce Intersection Safety Zone

Working with SFMTA, Supervisor Mandelman's office, and our neighborhood organizers developing proposals to create a safer passage for pedestrians, bicyclists, and drivers.

## Reflecting on 2022 Accomplishments

Dear Duboce Triangle Neighbors,

With an eventful 2022 and a wet January behind us, I'd like to take a moment to recognize some of the great things happening in the neighborhood.

Last December, the Castro Merchants Association hosted a Winter Wonderland Block Party on Noe Street with drag queen storytime, photos with Santa, a petting zoo, and a sexy elf contest that I judged alongside District Attorney Brooke Jenkins, Terrance Alan, and Suki Berry.

The Winter Wonderland is one of many events put on by the Merchants Association that my office helped fund, including the Castro Art Mart, which takes place on the first Sunday of every month from 11am - 5pm on Noe between Market and Beaver. I hope to see you at the next Art Mart, and here are some updates on our recent work.

**New Reforms to Manage Capital Infrastructure Projects:** With major funding for the future of SF transportation secured through Prop L on the November ballot, I recently introduced an ordinance to change the way City agencies manage construction projects and to increase accountability for City contractors. We are all too well aware of San Francisco's struggles in delivering large public works projects that have ended up delayed and over budget.

Too often contracts big and small go to the contractor that presents the lowest bid, even if all things considered, they may not be the best positioned to deliver the project. Or contractors with poor past performance continue winning new contracts with the City because we have not invested in appropriate safeguards to review past performance and ensure lessons learned from one project help inform future ones.

The reforms I introduced on December 13 would codify recommendations from the City's Civil Grand Jury to allow more flexibility in how bids for major capital projects are scored, eliminating a code requirement that a project cost must account for at least 40% of a bidder's score, and to require City departments to consult past contractor performance

evaluations when selecting contractors for a new project.

**Cannibis Tax Suspension Adopted:** On November 15, the Board voted to pass my ordinance suspending the City's Cannabis Business Tax through December 31, 2025. San Francisco has always led the way when it comes to cannabis, and this is a critical moment for the legal cannabis industry: It faces significant challenges, including unique cost pressures, a persistent illicit market, extreme price volatility, and a high overall tax burden. A joint is currently taxed at more than double the rate of a bottle of wine or a cocktail. With the Cannabis Business Tax in effect, a joint would be taxed at almost three times the rate of a bottle of wine.

We cannot expect legal cannabis operators to compete effectively with the unregulated market, which comprises approximately two-thirds of total cannabis sales in San Francisco, while adding new taxes. Illegal cannabis operators pay no taxes, don't apply for business permits, and don't subject their products to rigorous quality control. This suspension will allow legal operators to gain a foothold in the market and eventually contribute more to our City's general fund.

# How Will Triangle Residents Get Around in 2030? In 2050?

One way of figuring out what we need to work on right now is to dream big about what a bright future would look like. DTNA's Vision 2030 started as immediate plans for activating the pandemic-era Noe Slow Street, but with that street now permanent, it has expanded to a vision of how it connects to the rest of the streets in the Triangle and beyond.

Vision 2030 imagines the Triangle as a space where all those uses can happen seamlessly and safely together, at low speeds, quietly, and respectfully of both residents and the other modes of transportation. As a Spanish urban planner once remarked, "all the modes of transportation are equal. But the pedestrian is the most equal of all."

But what about beyond the

We know that whatever percentage of Triangle residents are still driving cars in 2030 (it's less than half of us now) those cars will be mostly electric, as California is phasing out gas-powered vehicles. We also know that even those of us who drive cars sometimes also ride an electric scooter, or an e-bike, or a bike bike, or we walk.

Triangle? Noe Street is not the only slow street in the city, and when we leave our houses our destinations are often in other neighborhoods, sometimes even in other cities (for example, I commute by bike and BART 35 miles each way to Lafayette every weekday). How can we make our routes to the wider world as safe and seamless

as the ones we are imagining for our local spaces?

It's only in the initial planning phases, but some bold visionaries have already started sketching out a city-wide map of bike and scooter routes that link the Slow Streets together. Right now the maps serve as rough guides, much like the cel-

ebrated Crosstown Trail that links parks and open spaces from the southeast to the northwest into one seamless hike. But the potential is there for more. Maybe not by 2030, but by 2050? We can all dream of a utopian future at least.

But the arc of history doesn't bend toward utopia

### Time to Review Your Membership Profile



## Historic Photo



Finnilla's was a Finnish bathhouse that served San Franciscans for 90 years—beginning on Douglass Street in 1910, moving to 17th Street in 1919, and finally landing on the corner of Market Street and Noe Street in 1932. There, it served our neighborhood until its building was demolished in 1985 to make way for the Market & Noe Center. The business moved out to the avenues in 1986, where it served women only until closing its doors 2000. According to legend, Clint Eastwood and the crew of *Dirty Harry* visited Finnilla's Finnish Baths while on location in the Bay Area.

### Upcoming Election for DTNA

# Honoring our Beloved Neighbor, Patrick Courtney

If you've ever lived or worked in the Duboce Triangle for any length of time, you most certainly know the legendary Courtney's Produce market at 14th and Castro. Chances are you met the store's husband-and-wife co-owners, Patrick and Lola Courtney. Chances are your devotion to the store's fresh-made sandwiches, fresh-squeezed juices, daily-delivered produce - and especially, its iconic peanut butter and jam treats - are key to the store's enduring operation for over five decades, earning it status as a "Legacy Business" in January 2020 with sup-

port from Supervisor Rafael Mandelman.

You may not know the sad news of Patrick's passing in November, 2022. We hope this account, drawn from a 2020 profile in the local newspaper Hoodline based on a timeline provided by Patrick's daughter Robin Courtney, can suitably honor our beloved neighbor.

Born in 1926 in County Kerry, Ireland, Patrick grew up in a very rural environment. "Everything they ate they grew as a family," his great-nephew Andrew Courtney told Hoodline. Patrick moved to New York

with his father in the 1940s, where they worked for an Italian grocer.

Patrick came to San Francisco where he met his wife Lola in 1964. Together they founded Courtney's Produce in 1969 and moved the store to its current location in 1971. Andrew credits the people of the neighborhood for keeping Courtney's thriving: "With so many friendly and talented people around, it is easy to feel at home and happy here."

Andrew managed the store for Lola and Patrick in the mid 2010's before moving to San Diego and then to Vermont. Paul Xie, who has worked for Courtney's since

1992 and is the current store manager, agrees. "It's a family store," he told Hoodline. "We all work together."

As immediate neighbors and regular patrons of Courtney's since 1988, my family and I have had the privilege to know Patrick, Lola, Robin, Andrew and Paul well. I agree whole-heartedly with a message Robin sent me in July 2020 to assure me that her father was doing well after surgeries, even in the throes of the Pandemic: "He is a strong and beautiful person."

Indeed. This is certainly how I will remember Patrick Courtney.


